DISSERTATION ABSTRACT

In contrast to the dominant view, I argue that Aristotle cannot consider the *enkrates* (self-controlled person) and *akrates* (person lacking self-control) to be different kinds of people. Instead, the difference between them can only be one of degree. First, *akrasia* proper is only about the pleasures of food and sex. Second, the specific epistemic failure of the akratic is that she fails to know that what she wants to do is wrong, even though she can recognize that actions of the same sort are wrong. Because her mistakes are so few and narrow, she is mainly enkratic. This means that healing morally bad character is easier than it is usually thought to be, even on Aristotle's account.
